WRI carried out an investigation to identify corridors, intersections, and areas with high pedestrian casualties and fatalities in the city. The identification of these spots allows prioritization of interventions to improve road safety for pedestrians in areas with high casualties and fatalities. The proposal is to present the results to participants, and invite suggestions and discussion on possible future steps to follow up on this analysis.
